Georgia      Before me John H. Little a Justice  
Franklin County, 3<sup>rd</sup> of the Peace in & for said County.  
personally appeared Samuel Daily, of said  
County, a respectable and credible person, aged eighty three years  
who being duly sworn, deposes and swears, that during the Revolu-  
tionary War, he was a resident of Dobbs County, North Caro-  
lina, a member of the family of Nathan Arendall, that during  
said War the said Nathan Arendall was drafted twice to  
serve in said War, & that he thinks each of those drafts were  
for the space of one year, & that he also thinks he served un-  
~~under Captain Cobb & Colonel Barwell~~, That in addition to his  
service as a drafted soldier, he was also engaged in several  
tours against the Tories, but does not know how long, that  
during the period for which he was last drafted or at the ex-  
piration of the same, he was brought home & ~~he~~ was then  
called a cur, being incapable of walking or riding on account  
of an attack of the Rheumatism, which occurred during that  
service, that he after a time partially recovered of that dis-  
ease, but was never sound afterwards, that after the close of  
the War, he removed to Elbert County Georgia, where he ~~now~~  
married Susanna Stanin daughter of ~~Laughlin~~ James  
as he understood, that the said Arendall, in about two  
years afterwards removed to Franklin County Georgia, where  
he afterwards died but deponent does not know in what  
year, that the said Arendall & his wife Susanna had six  
children viz, Rebecca, Mennifred John, Elizabeth, Laughlin  
& William.

On this Fifth day of June  
1,852, personally appeared in open Court, John Ar-  
endall aged 56 years, who being first duly sworn,  
according to law, doth on his oath make the follow-  
ing declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the  
provisions made by the act of Congress, passed on  
the seventh day of July 1838, & all other acts passed  
by the same, since that time, for the benefit of  
the widows & orphans of the officers & soldiers of  
the Revolutionary War, that he is the legitimate  
son & heir of Nathan Arendall formerly of Dobbs  
County, North Carolina, but at the time of his  
death of the County & State aforesaid, That  
the said Nathan enlisted as a private in the  
Army of the United States, during the Revolu-  
tionary War, in the Company of Captain Lobb  
Regiment of Colonel Caswell, as will more ful-  
ly appear by the affidavit of Samuel Bailey of  
said County, a member, at that time, of the fam-  
ily of said Nathan, as well as the certificate of  
William D. Clarke Comptroller of North Caro-  
lina, & was at various times drafted & volunteered  
to serve in that War against the British & Tory,  
That the said Nathan after the close of the  
War aforesaid, removed to the County of Elbert  
State aforesaid, as will appear by the affidavit  
of Samuel Bailey, accompanying this Declaration,  
where on or about the year 1790, he married the  
Susanna Tamm, daughter of Scanglin Tamm, as  
will appear by the affidavit of Jane Thornton,  
also accompanying this Declaration, by whom he  
had the following children, viz, Rebecca, Winni-  
fred John, this deponent, Elizabeth & William, &  
Scanglin,

That the said Nathan in about two years after his marriage aforesaid removed from the County aforesaid to Elbert, to Franklin County in said State, where he continued to reside until the time of his death, which occurred in said County on the 13th day of April 1823, That the said Nathan did not receive any pension from the United States during his life, according to the best of his recollection nor did his mother aforesaid during her life, defendant further says that his mother aforesaid died in said County of Franklin on the 13th day of July 1845, He further states that he has frequently heard his father the said Nathan speak of the battles in which he was engaged & the country through which he marched, but from the lapse of time has forgotten his statements relative thereto, having no papers, discharge or any other thing which could serve to refresh his recollection, his papers being destroyed shortly after his death, as being valuable. He further relinquishes any claim or annuity, except the present,

State of Georgia S. I. Be it remembered that on  
Franklin County this 26<sup>th</sup> day of October  
1853, before me, James Jackson,  
Judge of the Superior Court of the Metro-  
politan District of Georgia, personally appear-  
ed John Arendall one of the heirs of Nathan  
Arendall of said County, deceased, and made  
oath in due form of law, that he has no rec-  
ord evidence of the marriage of his father  
the said Nathan Arendall, and his mother Su-  
sannah Fannin, nor is it in his power to procure  
any, moreover that his said Father and mother had  
six children viz, Rebecca, Minifred, John, Elizabeth,  
Laughlin & William, the first of which was born  
during the year 1792. the latter died about the  
year 1805. That his father died during April  
1822. His mother died on the 13<sup>th</sup> day of ~~July~~  
1845.

On this the 6th day of July in the year 1855 before me  
a Justice of the Peace in and for said County and State  
personally appeared George Gober aged eighty four years  
a resident of the County and State aforesaid who after  
being sworn in due form of the law makes the following state-  
ment. That he moved from Granville Co. N.C. Carolina  
in the year 1799. and settled in Franklin Co. Georgia  
and immediately became well acquainted with Nathan Armudell  
who was at that time <sup>time</sup> living with his family in said County & State.  
That from that time (1799) this defendant lived near the  
said Armudell and had much intercourse with him and  
his family until his death, and with his family since his  
death until now. That he always understood from said  
Armudell and from every body who knew any thing about  
it that he had come from North Carolina where in time  
of the Revolutionary war he had served as a private soldier  
in the Militia of said State. That during his acquaintance with  
said Armudell he often heard him speak of his services in  
the Revolutionary war and heard him talk a great deal about  
his skirmishes with the Tories. That at that time there  
were a good many old Revolutionary soldiers living in Franklin  
County, and that said Armudell was regarded and respected  
by them all as having been a true whig and a soldier  
in said war. and that he never heard a contrary opinion  
expressed by any one. That from defendant's first acquain-  
tance with said Armudell he was afflicted with Rummelism.

that he always understood from him, and his friends also understood it, that he had contracted said disease while in the Revolutionary Service, that he had to go about on crutches, and that he was never relieved from this disease which he had, but was always a cripple. That at the time of his first acquaintance said Amend and his family, he and his, reputed wife Susannah, were living together as husband and wife and under good report, and had at that time (1799) four living children to wit, Rachael, Winfred, John, Laughlin and Elizabeth, the oldest of whom was then eight or nine years of age.

That from all that he ever heard of the said Nathan Amend, from the old people of that early day he fully believes and always did believe he was a faithful soldier of the Revolution of N. Carolina, and that he and his reputed wife Susannah were lawful husband and wife, that her name before marriage was Susannah Fairman, that he was personally acquainted with her parents, That the said Amend died in Franklin County Georgia about the year 1823, that his widow survived and remained his widow until her death, that she died in Sanil County & State in the year 1845, and that he is a disinterred witness,

Dear Madam:

You are furnished herein the record of Nathan Arendall as found in pension claim, R. 243, based upon his service in the Revolutionary War.

The date and place of birth and names of the parents of Nathan Arendall are not shown.

Nathan Arendall served fifty-nine days as a private in 1776, in Captain Cobb's company, Colonel Caswell's North Carolina regiment. At the time of his enlistment, he was a resident of Dobbs County, North Carolina.

The soldier married about the year, 1790, in Elbert County, Georgia, Susannah Fannin or Fannin, daughter of Laughlin Fannin or Fannin. The date and place of her birth and name of her mother not shown. The soldier died April 13, 1828, or in 1823, in Franklin County, Georgia, and his widow, Susannah, died July 15, 1846, in said Franklin County.

Their children were: Rebecca born in 1795; Winifred; John aged fifty-six years in 1838; Elizabeth; Laughlin, and William who died about the year 1803.

John Arendall applied June 5, 1838, in Franklin County, Georgia, for pension which might have been due on account of the services of his father, Nathan Arendall. He applied in behalf of himself and other surviving heirs named above.

The claim was not allowed as he failed to furnish proof of six months' service as required by the pension law.
